



Fire Fire Year 2 Autumn 2

Study overview

This is a study of two historical events beyond living memory (The Great Fire of London and Guy Fawkes' attack on parliament). Through this topic the children will further explore first-hand and second-hand accounts of events and start to interpret the past from a variety of primary and secondary sources. They will explore diaries (Samuel Peyps), news reports and paintings from the time to interpret the past. They will also look at two sides to an historical event by studying the motivation of Guy Fawkes to attack parliament and draw a conclusion about his actions based on starting to understand having a balanced viewpoint. Through looking at these significant historical events they will also compare these to the present day and ask themselves what the impact of these events has had on present day life. This will involve the children thinking about Fire Safety, and having a visit from fire fighters.
