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Local study / Magna Carta

Year 5

Autumn 2

Study overview

This local history module will focus on the establishment of the Cathedral after 1066 and how the town grew afterwards. The children will investigate the town's role in the creation of the Magna Carta in 1215. The children will study historical texts from the time and use this to find out about the past life of the town. They will explore the erosion of the very old Norman buildings and develop their understanding of change over time within a settlement. The children will also study how the earliest forms of written English were recorded, and how they act as a more reliable source of historical accuracy. The work studying erosion on very old Norman buildings builds on and consolidates the children's scientific/geographical understanding of erosion too. The children will also conduct a geographical study of why the town became an important manufacturer of sugar and beer (linking to locational position of Bury and its proximity to farming areas).

Key Vocabulary

History: constitution, barons, justice, treaty, charter, abbey, primary sources, secondary sources

Geography: import, export, farming, industry, settlement, erosion, manufacture

National Curriculum Objectives

A local History study:

- a study over time tracing how several aspects of national history are reflected in the locality (this can go beyond 1066)
- a study of an aspect of history or a site dating from a period beyond 1066 that is significant in the locality.

Geography:

• use fieldwork to observe, measure, record and present the human and physical features in the local area using a range of methods, including sketch maps, plans and graphs, and digital technologies.

Knowledge to be gained

To know:

- who the Normans were and why they invaded Great Britain.
- why the Magna Carta was necessary and how it was created.
- why the abbey was important in the story of the Magna Carta.
- Why the land use around the area led to the industries of the town.
